- 1. Santa Helena Sauvignon Blanc, CHILE**
This classic Chilean style of Sauvignon Blanc is lively and lifted, with a herbal green pea leafiness and real freshness through the finish. (2) 13%vol

Style Guide for White and Rosé Wines

White and rosé wines are numbered 1 to 9.

1 - Bone dry wines that are relatively light, such as Sauvignon Blanc from cooler climates will be marked 1.

2 - 2 is a far more common category with the vast majority of table wines fitting this group from Hungarian Riesling to French Mâcon-Lugny; from Italian Pinot Grigio to Australian Verdelho.

3 - 3 indicates a wine that is very slightly off-dry and a little richer in style.

3 - 5 - Medium-dry wines are between 3 and 5.

5 - 9 - Sweet wines range from 5 through to 9.

Style Guide for Red Wines

All red wines are listed A to E.

A - Light, soft, easy drinking wines will be at the 'A' end of the scale.

B - Slightly more serious but nevertheless, light, wines will be B.

C - C is the catch-all category that takes most red wines from Chilean Merlot to Spanish Rioja; from Argentinean Malbec to French Côte De Beaune.

D - Heavier, more concentrated wines fall into the D zone - such as our Australian Shiraz.

E - E is reserved for the real heavyweights of great density, power and quality such as a Reserve Shiraz.
